Administration

Call to Order: Col Peter Kloeber called the meeting to order at 0806.

Pledge of Allegiance: Mrs. Pam Wojtas led the attendees in the Pledge of Allegiance.

Invocation: The invocation was given by Chaplain (COL) Thomas Day, Coronado Chapter President.

President's Opening Comments / Into of Guests

Welcome

- Col Pete Kloeber welcomed everyone to our virtual meeting and thanked them for attending. He mentioned that the early start time was so it would end early and still have time left in the day.
- Col Kloeber thanked Chaplain Day for giving the invocation and stated the council is fortunate to have him. He also asked Chaplain Day to continue as the Council Chaplain when he was no longer the Coronado Chapter President.
- o Col Kloeber stated he hoped everyone attending would feel the meeting was worthwhile and would leave with some good information from the meeting.
- O Col Kloeber stated that at the Spring Council Meeting, he talks about "Storming the Hill" and presents the communications awards. At the Fall Council Meeting, he presents the LOE awards and the budget for the following year gets approved.
- Col Kloeber also stated that he tries to rotate speakers with one meeting focusing on National MOAA and the other on local / state issues.
- Voting 5 different Votes during the meeting.
 - Council officers, Chapter President or their Representative, and Past Council Presidents are eligible to vote.
 - Zoom Poll Let's everyone eligible to vote check yes or no and then tallies the percentage.

- Introductions
 - Col Kloeber introduced John Scott, Deputy Director, ADVS and Jennifer Harris, Legislative Liaison, ADVS.

Speaker: John Scott, Deputy Director, ADVS

Deputy Director, John Scott, had a few comments before his slide presentation (see slide presentation below comments).

Deputy Director Scott stated that the Arizona Department of Veterans' Service is a state agency which serves and provides advocacy to service members, Veterans and their families.

He mentioned that there are two new Veteran Homes under construction and that construction is ahead of schedule. He stated that both homes will need volunteers for the new homes once completed and that with COVID it is very difficult to recruit volunteers.

Deputy Director Scott stated that because of the pandemic that VBCs have been doing Zoom Meetings instead of meeting in person which has helped cut the claims processing time. The VBCs processed \$56 million in claims in one month. The VA has granted about 90% of the claims submitted by the VBCs. The VBCs are starting to look at locations where they can have in-person meetings, such as VFW or American Legion locations.

Deputy Director Scott stated that ADVS takes very seriously the homeless Vet situation. He stated that for every Vet who finds housing another Vet becomes homeless. As of September 2020, there were 775 homeless Vets. He also stated that StandDowns have helped in the past with homelessness but with the pandemic it has been difficult to have StandDowns.

Deputy Director Scott also mentioned that Military Family Relief Fund requests have slowed down during COVID, but expects them to start picking up again in a couple of months.

Deputy Director Scott stated the time is now to apply for large grants as the period to apply closes on December 18, 2020.

New State Veteran Homes

- In 2019, we broke ground on new State Veteran Homes in Yuma and Flagstaff
- Estimated construction completion: Summer 2021
- Each resident room will be furnished and private
- We will hire 125 employees to staff each home, including registered nurses, licensed practical nurses, dietitians and aides, housekeeping and administrative services
- Each home will be on 10 acres of land donated by the cities of Flagstaff and Yuma
- The homes will offer services and amenities similar to those at the current homes, like housekeeping, laundry services, a meditation room, a gift shop, a barber / beauty shop and more

Veteran Benefits Counselors (VBCs)

- VBCs are accredited by the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs and advocate for Arizona's service members, Veterans and their families with receiving federal and state Veteran benefits. VBCs also advocate for American Legion clients.
- VBCs assist claimants by:
 - o Educating them on eligibility requirements for benefits
 - o Processing VA compensation and pension applications
 - Appealing VA decisions
 - o Representing claimants at VA hearings
 - o Filing for survivor's benefits
 - o Referring claimants to other agencies for potential benefits
 - o Requesting military service records and certifying DD-214s (discharge paperwork)
 - o Discussing State Veterans Benefits
- Virtual VBC
 - o Phone, email and video appointments
 - o Began in 2017
- Completed transition to remote work in October 2020
 - Post COVID-19, VBCs will set-up itinerant sites to conduct appointments where there's need
- \$650 million tax free dollars annually from compensation, pension and survivor benefits to Arizona Veteran families
- 3,000 Veterans served each month
 - o Since July 2020, 400 new clients per month

Arizona Veterans' Memorial Cemeteries

- Arizona Veterans' Memorial Cemeteries offer burials to all eligible members of the Armed Forces. For a fee, the Veteran's spouse and qualifying dependents are also eligible.

- Due to COVID-19, all family members, attendees, funeral home personnel, military honors providers, and cemetery staff must wear a face mask while on cemetery grounds.

Arizona Military Family Relief Fund

- The Military Family Relief Fund (MFRF) was established by the Arizona Legislature to provide financial assistance to families of currently deployed service members, as well as military and Veteran families that have experienced a hardship caused by a deployment.
 - For separated service members, this includes, but is not limited to, hardships caused by service-connected disabilities
- The lifetime financial assistance limit is \$20,000 per family
- Over \$1 million awarded to Arizona Veteran families in 2019

Veteran Toolkit

- The Veteran Toolkit Program funds expenses associated with beginning employment for Veterans
 - For example, if a Veteran is getting a job in the medical field and needs scrubs before they start, the toolkit will buy the scrubs to make sure there are no barriers standing between the Veteran and their new job
- Over \$135,000 granted in FY20, assisting 372 Veterans
- Qualifying Veterans must:
 - o Live in Arizona
 - o Have a job offer and are in need of tangible items to start employment
 - Visit any ARIZONA@WORK office to apply

Arizona Veterans' Donation Fund

- The Arizona Veterans' Donation Fund (VDF) assists programs and initiatives that benefit Veterans and their families. The VDF supports Arizona's Veteran community through small grants (\$4,999 or less) and large grants (\$5,000 \$75,000), each with their own application process
 - VDF Large Grant Cycle open through December 18, 2020
- More than \$1 million granted yearly to support the Veteran community
 - o Organizations can find the application process on our website

- Funds come from tax-deductible charitable donations and the purchasing of Veteran, Women Veterans or Freedom Arizona license plates

Arizona Action Plan to End Homelessness Among Veterans

- We take seriously the challenge of assisting homeless Veterans to find safe shelter where possible
- The Arizona Action Plan to End Homelessness Among Veterans began in 2010 we've seen success, but there's still work to be done
- ADVS and the Arizona Housing Coalition are collaborating to institute three key goals and 26 regionalized objectives to sustain efforts to end homelessness among Veterans in Arizona
- As of Sept 2020, the "By Name List" showed 775 homeless Veterans
- Goals
 - o End street / shelter homelessness among Veterans
 - o Transform the temporary help system
 - o Ensure ongoing system functionality for all Veterans experiencing homelessness
- StandDown Events
 - ADVS assists in funding StandDown events hosted by the Arizona Veterans StandDown Alliance.
 - o StandDowns provide benefits and services to thousands of Veterans a year

Speaker: Jennifer Harris, Legislative Liaison, ADVS

Jennifer Harris gave a comprehensive update on State Legislative issues a couple of which were to acquire more VBCs and increase the state tax exemption, but then COVID happened and nothing happened. A few specific items included:

- There were a lot of Vet Bills on the House and Senate floors, but when COVID hit, the gallery closed on March 15th. The Legislation started working again on March 23rd and passed a skinny budget which was just enough to keep the state going
- The legislature came back again May 26th but adjourned without conducting any business; no budget for 2021, no Defense Authorization Bill
- There was a Veteran suicide bill which was to go to the governor but with COVID that never happened
- The FY22 budget development will be a cautious use of money; baseline needs, structured use
- There was a Stakeholder Meeting on September 14th
- She does a Legislative update every week and always looks for Military and Veteran Bills to include. The update is on the ADVS website

Levels of Excellence Awards – Col Pete Kloeber

Col Kloeber stated that he was very proud of all of the Arizona Chapters for obtaining 5-star awards.

Col Kloeber stated he has the Communication Awards and the LOE Awards. He said he was optimistic and told MOAA to mail both to him, hoping we would be meeting in person. Since that did not happen, he will mail the Awards to the Chapters.

Reports of Officers

Secretary – Mrs. Pam Wojtas

- Approval of Meeting Minutes 1 May 2020 (Vote #1) Mrs. Wojtas stated that she received no corrections or additions to the minutes and asked for a motion to approve the minutes as written. Motion was made by COL Tom Day to approve the minutes and seconded by Col Gary Fredricks. Motion passed 16 0.
- Confirm Meeting Attendance Mrs. Wojtas took the attendance roster virtually. A copy of attendees is filed with the meeting minutes. A quorum was confirmed.
- Chapter Officers Roster Update Prior to the council meeting, Mrs. Wojtas distributed to
 each Chapter President their portion of the master roster and asked for updates. Mrs.
 Wojtas stated that the updated master roster will be distributed to the Council Staff and
 Members, Chapter Presidents, Satellite Presidents and Past Council Presidents after the
 council meeting.

Treasurer - Col Charlie Bitner

Col Bitner presented the 2020 budget recap, the banking summary and the council account balance (copies attached with the minutes). One slide showed the income and expense and the ending balance. Another slide was a copy of the actual balances printed directly from the Chase Bank account. Col Bitner stated that by showing both slides, it was a mini audit.

Col Bitner stated that the Council did not spend much money due to COVID.

2021 Budget (Vote #2)

Col Bitner presented the budget for 2021. He stated that with COVID still continuing it is very hard to determine what exactly will be spent. He has budgeted for in-person Council meetings and travel reimbursement, but may not happen if COVID continues.

Motion was made by Col Bill Wojciechowski to approve the budget and seconded by MAJ Pete Berger. Motion passed 16-0.

Copy of the budget is filed with the minutes.

President - Col Pete Kloeber

A summation of some of Col Kloeber's slides. His presentation slides follow this summation.

Col Kloeber stated he is very proud of the Chapters who received MOAA Grants. MOAA awarded 108; Arizona has 8. The grants awarded to Arizona amounted to over \$28,000.

Col Kloeber commented on the COVID-19 Relief Grants. He stated that if there is a Veteran in your area in need of help because of COVID, apply for the Relief Grant. MOAA turns around these requests in 8-9 days.

Col Kloeber commented on "Be Connected". He stated that six months ago, only one Chapter was a "Be Connected" partner. Today all nine Chapters and the Council are partners. Col Kloeber stated he sent Thomas Winkle all Chapter Presidents names. All Chapters have been invited to join their respective Community Network (Northern, Central or Southern).

Col Kloeber commented on the MOAA Grant and said it was often just a band-aid for the Veteran. Give the Veteran money needed, but also ask if his / her name can be given to "Be Connected". LTC Steve Jarvis stated that giving the name to "Be Connected" is not any additional work for your Chapter because "Be Connected" Navigators do all the work.

Col Kloeber commented that there will be a new system for the Committee Module which will come out sometime in November / December. The name will remain the same.

Col Kloeber also stated that Arizona is known at MOAA as the Premier Group of Chapters when it comes to using the Committee Module. Nationwide, 322 Chapters use the Committee Module.

Col Kloeber commented on the new Virtual Chapter for USPHS officers. The Chapter was approved on October 23rd and at that time had 39 members. As of today, they have 72 members. Col Kloeber is an advisor to the Chapter; cannot be a member because he is not USPHS.

 - Only show for leader position
- Non-MOAA Members
 - o "View All" then Click on "Membership" puts all "Blanks" at top
 - o "View All" then Click on "Last/First Name" sorts by name
- Members Who Move
 - o Tell MSC new address <u>BEFORE</u> entering "End Date"
- DO NOT
 - o Include "End Date" for "Member" unless deceased or removed from Chapter

- If submit Common Join Form for new member / or member joins online
 - o Still need to add to CM

Virtual Meetings Best Practices

- All are using latest version of virtual software with most current updates
- Use the waiting room feature
- Enable password protection
- Do not share links to virtual meetings via social media posts
- Send links to participants close to event start to minimize sharing
- Host should manage screen sharing do not allow others to share as default
- Ask all participants to mute microphones when not speaking; use chat
- Lock meeting once all participants have joined
- Have security settings on by default

Legislative Chair – Col Lee Lange

Col Lange commented that due to COVID there were no successes; no progress on VBCs and no progress on increasing the state tax exemption. He also stated that there is no budget for 2021 and no Defense Authorization Bill.

Col Lange stated that there is a consortium which will bring together all legislative members in the country to exchange ideas on how to attack state issues. One issue will be the state tax exemption.

Col Lange stated that the state desperately needs more VBCs.

Col Lange said that either the Chapter Legislative Chair or other members of your Chapter need to reach out to their Representative at least one time a year. He stated a good time to reach them is when they are home on summer recess.

Surviving Spouse Program – Mrs. Sharon Douglas

See below comments and questions which followed Mrs. Douglas' presentation. Her slide presentation follows the comments and questions.

Lt Col Dick Jonas asked Mrs. Douglas how many members belong to the Surviving Spouse Virtual Chapter. Mrs. Douglas stated that there are 200 Nationwide.

Col Pete Kloeber received Mrs. Douglas' presentation on Surviving Spouse and Personal Affairs which she presented to the Yuma Chapter. Col Kloeber stated that the presentation contained a lot of good information on both and suggested that Chapters contact Mrs. Douglas to get a copy. Mrs. Douglas said she will send a copy to the Chapter Presidents. **Action Item**

(Action completed following the meeting and prior to publishing minutes.)

CW4 Arlan Allen asked Mrs. Douglas the percentage of surviving spouses covered under DIC versus SBP. Mrs. Douglas stated she was not sure. CW4 Allen also asked if surviving spouses are having to payback money. Mrs. Douglas stated it depends on the circumstances and individual cases.

Mrs. Douglas thanked everyone for all their hard work to get the repeal of the Widows' Tax (SBP / DIC) passed.

SBP – DIC Offset Phased Elimination Timetable

- The National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA) for the year 2020 modified the law and allows for surviving spouses to receive both dependency and indemnity compensation (DIC) and survivor benefits plan (SBP) payments without penalty
- 2021 SBP will be reduced by no more than two-thirds of DIC, rather than the whole amount
- 2022 SBP will be reduced by no more than one-third of the amount of DIC received

- 2023 SBP DIC offset will be eliminated in total, allowing for full payments of both. This will be effective Jan of 2023 and paid Feb 2023
- The most important action SBP annuitants can take at this time is to **ensure your** annuity account information is up-to-date and includes your correct mailing address so you can be contacted, if needed. Also, if you're not using myPay, set up a profile now and add your email address. Please note: only annuitants who are currently receiving an SBP or SSIA payment from DFAS can access myPay
